



rofessor Celestine O. E. Onwuliri, a Professor of Zoology (Parasitology) and Acting Vice-Chancellor, University of Jos became the fifth substantive Vice-Chancellor of the Federal University of Technology, Owerri following his appointment by the Visitor to the University, His Excellency, Chief Olusegun Obasanjo, GCFR, President, Commander-in-Chief of the Armed Forces, Federal Republic of Nigeria.

reception, which took place in the Vice-Chancellor's Conference Room in the Senate Building, Prof. Onwuliri attributed his appointment to God and counted on God's grace for strength, wisdom and a spirit of discernment. He promised to sustain peace and tranquility and to "collectively and assiduously move FUTO forward", through the Implementation of his 2006-2011 Strategic Plan for the University.

The new Vice-Chancellor performed his first official function,

He meritoriously served the nation as Honourable Commissioner for Information. Culture, Youth and Sports, and also as Honourable Commissioner for Agriculture and Natural Resources, Imo State.

In recognition of his enormous contributions to the physical and manpower development of his community, Professor Onwuliri was conferred with the chieftaincy title Okanmuta Nwachinemere of Amuzi Mbaise by the Traditional Ruler of his autonomous community in December 1997.

"I OWE MY APPOINTMENT TO GOD" - FUTO VC

Professor Celestine Onyemobi Elihe Onwuliri, new Vice-Chancellor of the Federal University of Technology, Owerri, in a gesture of recognition of Divine Providence at work, attributed his appointment to God. He made this declaration, while addressing Management, Deans and Directors, on

arrival at the University.

In tandem with the Reform Agenda of the Obasanjo administration, he promised to position the University, with a view to attracting more resources from the private sector, alumni and from government and international agencies. He stated his commitment to the implementation of his

2006-2011 Strategic Plan for the comprehensive growth and development of the University.

In this encounter with FUTONews crew, he speaks of his plans for the University and his achievements so far as he clocks 100 days in office.

Sir, Please give us a little insight on the man Prof. C. O. E. Onwuliri - who is he precisely?

am Prof. Celestine Onyemobi Elihe Onwuliri, a Professor of Zoology with speciality in Parasitology. I was born into a family of warriors from Amuzi in Ahiazu Mbaise Local Government of Imo State. I schooled in my village at Community Secondary School Amuzi and finished in Division one in 1971 after which I proceeded to the University of Nigeria, Nsukka where I got my first degree in 1975 and my Ph.D in 1980 Magna Cum Lauda. I am a Catholic, second in command in the Knight of St. John International with a rank of a Brigadier General. I am married to Professor (Mrs.) Viola Onwuliri and the marriage is blessed with five children, three of whom have graduated from the university.

How did you feel when you learnt you had been appointed the Vice-Chancellor of FUTO?

I felt good. I applied for the job but before then, I was the Deputy ViceChancellor (Academic) at the University of Jos after which I was appointed the Ag, Vice-Chancellor. It was from there that I applied, attended the interview and was recommended by the Governing Council and it also pleased His Excellency President Olusegun Obasanjo to appoint me as the Vice-Chancellor of this University in June this year. I give glory to God. I thank Mr. President for finding me worthy of this honourable position. I have also taken it up as a challenge to do everything humanly possible make a success of this appointment even if it as a way of saying thank you to Mr. President.

What do you think gave you an upper hand in the interview that won you your present position?

Well, the position of the Vice-Chancellor is not an all comers affair. It

is a position where people that are experienced and innovative will surely emerge. A lot of things are taken into consideration. In addition to cognitive experience, the role one has played in the system, level of positions occupied in the past and ability to allow the university pass through you in your career all come to play.

I believe all these put together helped the Council to make their choice. I have held virtually all positions in the university system, from a lecturer, twotime HOD, three-time Dean and

Chairman of many Committees. As Chairman of the Endowment Committee in UniJos, I raked in N308 million for the University. I was also once the Deputy Vice-Chancellor, Academic from where I rose to become the Ag. Vice-Chancellor in UniJos before my present appointment and all these happened in a University outside my own zone. Also, there has to be that ability to be known nationally and internationally as well as the ability to be a good teacher who motivates. I have for instance produced 20 Ph.D holders ten of whom are professors today. One is even a Deputy Vice-Chancellor here in Imo and there are others, who are professors of national repute. Currently I have over 6 Ph.D student. I'm supervising at the University of Jos.

Sir, we would want to know your vision cum mission for this university and how you intend to achieve them.

Before the interview, we were asked to put down our vision for the university. The uppermost in my mind is improving the quality of training and research. I would want FUTO products to be among the best in the country. The issue of producing those who will not get jobs has become a source of worry. We will all work together, motivating our staff to be alive to their responsibility. I intend to run a university that is ICT-compliant where Registry and Bursary activities will be computerised. It will be ICT in all areas. I want a university where



you access the internet from anywhere. A university where ICT will be used for teaching not just having centres. In no distant time, every staff will have a laptop. We are already working towards that. I am interested in a 5-year strategic plan. I have already submitted the plan to a committee that is harmonising it here in FUTO. The welfare of staff and students is paramount in my vision. I want everybody to be happy. Plans are on ground to alleviate the problems of staff having to commute about 30kms everyday to work. I have also adopted the build-operate and transfer (BOT) system to build staff quarters. Currently, I have signed memoranda of understanding with two contractors to build hostels for students. One is already on site.

I have also vowed to pay staff salaries as at when due. The issue of water and electricity is being addressed. Recently, I commissioned a 500 litre elevated tank bore hole project and a 500 KVA transformer sub-station for the students hotels. Due for commissioning presently are the Project Management and Biological Sciences buildings and these were built with internally generated revenue. I'm glad to say I don't have problems with students and no problems with cultism and for that I give God the glory. Against the opinion of most people FUTO was able to host NANS National Convention soon after I assumed office and it was successful.

Peace reigns in FUTO. We also had a peaceful and successful Students Union election and the academic calendar has been successfully completed Right now, students are waiting for their Batch A posting. Come end of November/early December, we will hold our convocation. Without peace on campus we couldn't have achieved all these. However, we still had pockets of examination mal-practice

here and there during the rain semester examination but I can assure you that those caught will really face the music. It is my desire to also encourage vibrant and responsible staff and students unionism. FUTO is one of the few universities that is current with their academic calendar. This is a huge effort and I congratulate the staff on these monumental achievements. We are also linking up with some national and international organisations such as the IITA on mass production of cassava, the NDDC, Chevron, Texaco, banks and international organisations with regard to our energy centre.

What was your personal opinion of FUTO before your recent appointment?



Prof. Celestine O. E. Onwuliri - VC, FUTO

I have always had a high opinion of this university. I have always admired their ability to produce very good products. That informed my sending my son here. He is an alumnus of this university. He lost two sessions waiting for FUTO. If I didn't have confidence in the University, I wouldn't have sent my children here. FUTO has a very good reputation, and even people in National Assembly are supporting the university.

How do you see the present crop of Nigerian graduates and how do you intend to improve on that in FUTO?.

Once someone has gone through the university and come out, he or she should be able to cope, except of

course those who come to waste their time. You see graduates who did not read Banking or relevant courses are doing well in the banking industry. There is no academic staff that will be happy that his students are not doing well. Give them references, show them how to use the internet, teach the effective use of the library and you see them very productive. The problem is infrastructural development. It is not growing at the same pace with the students. We need more industries. With the present administration and reforms, we believe there will be expansion in these areas. In America and Europe you see Nigerians in all areas because they are developed. These fallow lands should be cultivated and turned into Agro-allied industries.

Outside the office, what else do you derive pleasure in doing?

I am a very happy person. I try my best to keep myself happy. I try to relate with everybody. I have a very close family and a close relationship with my wife. I like to see people happy and I try as much as possible to laugh up to a 100 times everyday. I also like helping people. That has formed my philosophy of training so many Nigerians. Anybody I have trained at the postgraduate level is close knit with my family. Everything I have today I owe to God and Mother Mary. When I remember that I do good to others. I don't bother myself much. My day begins with God is Mass and I don't play with my Rosary. Besides, no amount of threat or mischief can make me turn away from doing the right thing and helping people.

You were nicknamed 'Dr. Do Good' while you were at UniJos, what informed this nickname?

Actually I was called Dr. Kindness because I don't like seeing people suffer. I prefer students seeing us as





their parents and friends. I have always fought against anybody exploiting students. Any lecturer that takes money or has any amoral relationship with any student is not worthy to be a lecturer and I don't take such things lightly when brought before me. For me, if I give you a question requiring five points, and you give me five points. I will give you 100%. I made sure students got what was their due. That was what gave me that nickname. I believe in flexibility of borderline in presenting results. I don't see the difference between 39% and 40%, upgrade 39 to 40 to allow such a student go. An 'A' is 5 points that is 70% and above. If a student scores 69, he should be given that one mark that will give him an 'A'. The one mark he could not score could be a miscalculation. I want to see many students come out with a 1st class. We should encourage students, to reach their potentials. I believe that our students should do better than ourselves. Dr. Kindness has been a chorus since 1980 and I give glory to

Sir, who are your mentors?

My major mentor is God. I also count myself very lucky because I passed through the hands of brilliant and eminent Professors like Prof. A. O. Anya, Prof. A. B. C. Nwosu, Prof. Gabriel Umezurike and Prof. M. O. E. Iwuala. They have all attained great heights in this society. There were also Professor Donald Lee, Prof. H.J. Atkinson of the University of Leeds and Professor Chiweyite Ejike, my teacher and great person who took me to Jos. Above all, my wife has been a great mentor, she contributed immensely to my Ph.D. programme. She is an internationally acclaimed Professor of Medical Bio-Chemistry. She is largely responsible for what I am today.

We learnt you have a First Class son? how were you able to combine your busy schedule and your role as a father and what is the secret?

Absolute trust in God. My son attended morning mass everyday. I told them right from day one that my certificates were not transferable. I encouraged them to work hard to earn anything they want in life. Above all, I always encourage them to keep their hands clean. I feel great that his efforts were rewarded. Immediately after graduation he had well over fifteen job offers to choose from. Today he is an international staff of Schlumberger. I attended his convocation with my wife where he received a standing ovation after his valedictory speech at the great University of Nigeria, Nsukka.

What would you like to be remembered for at the end of your tenure?

Well, I'm just beginning. I will like to be remembered as the Vice-Chancellor that came to FUTO and moved FUTO forward, reconciled warring factions, motivated his staff and related well with students and staff.

One last word, Sir?

We should all come together and pray to God for help, wisdom and strength. Let's ask God to make the people working with us to realise that our stay here is but for a short time. That way we will all co-operate without rancour. Let our one day's job be pleasing to God and humanity so that we will all help move this University forward. Peace and truth have been the name of the game for U. F. Abdulllahi, Esq. Here he speaks about his person, position and interest.

Sir, we all know you as the Pro-Chancellor but we hardly know much about you as a person, please tell us a little about yourself. My name is Umaru Faruk Abdullahi. I was born in Danlasan in Warawa Local Government Area of Kano State on 25 of April, 1948 to the family of my late father, who was a Chief of my village. Early enough, he took me to the Emir of Kano where I was turbaned in April 1991 to inherit my father's position before he died. had my junior primary school in Dawakin

Kudi between 1955 1958 and my senior primary in Wudil. My secondary education was between 1962 and 1966 at Birnin Kudu Government Secondary School. After my WAEC examination, those of us who did Mathematics were taken to British Bank of West Africa (BBWA) for a test.

The test was conducted and I passed and was given employment on the same day. I started as Bills Clerk and worked for two years in that bank. From there, I proceeded to Central Bank of Nigeria in 1967 and while there I got admission for a Diploma programme in Law. I graduated in June 1971 with a Diploma in Law. I worked briefly with Kano Judiciary as a Registrar before I got admission again into Ahmadu Bello University to study Law in October 1971, graduated with LLB in 1975. From there I went to Nigerian Law School where I finally qualified in June 1976 and have been a lawyer since then for 30 years. At the end of my NYSC in Bauchi State I proceeded to Kano State Ministry of Justice for a short while and from there I moved to the Kano State

Investment and Properties Ltd first as an Assistant Legal Adviser. That organisation is the investment vehicle of Kano State and is responsible for all shares held by Kano State. After ten years, I rose to Company Secretary/Legal Adviser and later became the General Manager Legal Services. In 1988, one midnight, my wife woke me up to say I have been appointed Commissioner for Justice, Kano State. I never lobbied for it. That was between (1988-91). I have never looked for job,

jobs just come to me. As the Attorney General of the State, I was called to Abuja for an interview with Corporate Affairs Commission (CAC). I was Registrar General of CAC from June 2, 1991 to October 31, 2000. I have my own Chambers in Abuja Hamdalla Chambers; Hamdalla means "I am In April 2005, I was satisfied". appointed Chairman of Council of FUTO. I have attended many courses and conferences both nationally and internationally.

I am a born traveller and have visited at least 45 countries in the world. Have also been appointed Nominee Director in at least 27 Companies. So far, I have enjoyed the exposure and experience all these opportunities and appointments have afforded me. I have both industrial and commercial experiences without owing an industry and shop.

As a Northerner, how has it been relating with people from this part of the country, given differences in religion and culture?

Anywhere I go is home for me. I have been to all states in this country except Bayelsa. I was in Owerri first in 1992. Certainly I have made friends in Owerri and I enjoy Ofe Owerri very much. As for religion, it is something that comes from God and is very personal. It should not be and will not be a barrier to making friends.

When you were appointed the Pro-Chancellor, we believe you came with a vision, having spent 17 months on seat, what would you say have been the major achievements of the 8th Governing Council of which you are the Chairman?

Where one goes, one should have a vision. My mission is in consonance with the statutes of the University. It is my mission to continue the peaceful atmosphere in FUTO against what is obtainable in other universities. To maintain harmony in a place like FUTO is a great achievement. In the area of achievement, it is worthy to note that in the past only N80,000 was budgeted for FUTO for research, when we came, it was increased to N80,000,000.



The Pro-Chancellor emphasizing the need for peace

Before we constituted, there were no landlines just because of N8.8 million expressed from FUTO as counterpart funding for the project. Council approvedpayment of that and land lines were finally installed. Council has increased the allowance of professors. We have recently appointed new auditors for FUTO who are currently working on the account of FUTO from 2002 till date. Council has also directed that an Asset Register be opened in FUTO to enable the University know what we have on That is now a ministerial directive, which we incidentally had commenced before the directive even came. Finally, Council has succeeded

in installing a substantive Vice-Chancellor for the University.

Now that you finally succeeded in installing a new Vice-Chancellor and Registrar, how do you feel? What was the process like?

I feel very normal. There is always a beginning and an end to everything. I notice that people in this state take appointments very seriously. It is not a big deal to appoint a Vice-Chancellor but given the scenario, it was really hectic. Unfortunately, the President did not pick any out of the first three names we sent, so the process has to be repeated. The process was indeed hectic and most times money consuming. We even faced threats here and there. I had never experienced a tense security situation like the one we did. For me as person I am never bothered by threats of death because it must come one day. There were a lot of lies in the papers. A lot of people were not happy with the nullification. God knows we never compromised our position both in the first and second exercise.

Are you envisaging any policy change?

I'm not aware of any change.

What have you to say on the Federal Government Policies on Education?

No government comes out with a policy without consulting the experts. Nobody has complained and I can't either.

Who is your mentor?

God my creator is my mentor.

What principle do you hold dear to your heart?

To be straight forward, tell the truth no matter how hurtful it is. Learn to leave things to God, no matter what comes to





you, don't blame anybody. If anything happens to me, I believe God knows about it. If anything good comes, I thank God. Don't portray what you are not. I don't believe in 'table' friends, I still keep my friends of my youth.

Pro-Chancellor Sir, from what do you derive joy most?

Sports. I have been in the management of football. I play good football and I'm a good horse-rider. I am also a good family man. I enjoy my family. I have three wives and so many children.

We notice, you don't add Alhaji to your name?

FUTONews brings Mr. Omeire home to you in this revealing interviews.

Sir, who is Mr. Charles Omeire?

Thank you. Mr. Charles Omeire is by the special grace of God the incumbent Registrar of Federal University of Technology, Owerri (FUTO), someone with a very humble beginning. I am an alumnus of University of Calabar with a Bachelor of Arts (BA) in Education. Religion/Political Science. I graduated with a second class upper division in 1986. After Youth Service, I went to the University of Ibadan and did a Masters Degree Programme in Political Science specialising in Public Administration in 1988. By my performance, I was eligible to directly proceed to do my Ph.D, but did not continue. My first employment was in 1989 when I was employed by the Federal College of Education, Gombe as Administrative Officer. That lasted between 1989 1992 when I left

Gombe for Imo State University (IMSU) where I was one of the pioneer staff. There, I worked as Senate/Council Affairs Officer and I worked closely with the then Registrar, Dr. G. C. Ukaga who was reputed to be an excellent administrator. I left IMSU in 1994 again, as pioneer staff of Micheal

Okpara University of Agriculture Umudike, then Federal College of Agriculture, Umudike. I worked first as College Officer in College of Biological/Physical Sciences after which I was discovered as it were by the Pioneer Vice-Chancellor and drafted to the Office of the Vice-Chancellor where I worked as Protocol Officer, Executive Assistant to the Vice-Chancellor and Public Relations Officer respectively. I was later posted to fix the General Administration Unit of the Registry. It was on that beat that I was until I was appointed Registrar of FUTO. Interestingly, two days before the FUTO interview, the Vice-Chancellor of Umudike invited me to his office and told me that though new in Umudike, he had heard testimonies of my person, observed me and was impressed by my performance at the Registrarship interview at Umudike

where I emerged the 3rd candidate. He said he would want me to work with him as his Executive Assistant. This was happening on Tuesday. By Thursday, the FUTO interview was held and by Monday the next week, there was already indication that I had been appointed the Registrar of FUTO. Even at that he insisted I worked with him. I left Umudike as Executive Assistant to the Vice-Chancellor. I am a modest person, a practicing Christian and one who is very conscious of the fact that God has been very kind to me. I utilize any opportunity available to serve God and As a person, I am humanity. disciplined and cherish integrity, discipline and truth from those around me. These are principles very dear to me. I abhor injustice, victimisation or oppression. I believe that wherever one is, one should see it as the making of God and use the platform to serve God and people.


At what point did you start showing interest in the position you are presently occupying and what was your attraction to FUTO among other universities?

My coming to FUTO was God's design. I never deliberately wanted to be here. While preparing for the Umudike interview, I accidentally saw FUTO advertisement for the position of Registrar in the newspaper.

At first, I didn't give it much thought. My wife however encouraged me; she was not very comfortable with Umudike and she encouraged me to apply to FUTO. I did and prepared and by God's own design, I was adjudged the best candidate inspite of my inadequacies. I am here as a divine messenger and ambassador, and not as a stooge or surrogate of any person or group of persons. That consciousness will guide my actions here in FUTO. My emergence as Registrar is a clear affirmation of the sovereignty of God and the fact that whatever God has ordained will come to pass.

What were the good things you met on ground and in what ways would you want to improve on them?

When I came here, I met a university with a solid structure, rich tradition, a

But owing to crowded schedule, I have not been able to complete my familiarisation tour. I have emphasised the fact that we are here to work towards the improvement of the system and to work towards restoration of the dignity, aura and reverence for which the university is known.

As I have said earlier, the University is one of the three institutions that is hallowed and sacred, the other two being the Church/Mosque and the law court. These institutions require a comportment that is distinct from being casual or ordinary. It is a privilege for anyone to be in the University setting either as a staff or student. What was your reaction when you realised you had been made the Registrar of FUTO?

I felt humbled like David, and I cried unto God. I wondered who am I and what is my family that God has brought me this far. For me, it is a big challenge and heavy responsibility and I continue to ask close associates to continue to pray that God will grant me wisdom, discernment and favour to see me through.

Who is your model?

My primary model is our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ who exemplified servant and shepherd leadership. I look forward in all I do to look like him. I have also drawn inspiration from people I have worked with one way or the other. These include Dr. G. C. Ukaga, Professor Placid Njoku, Professor Ikenna Onyido. My late father was also a great influence on my person. He was outstanding for discipline, hardwork and integrity and I inherited these qualities from him.

What about your upbringing would you say has contributed more to your success so far in life?

My background has been a very instructive one. I come from a family that is united and God fearing, where you are given opportunity to be yourself. I was brought up to respect elders, constituted authority and to strive for excellence. These have one way or the other influenced me.

When you are not working, what else do you do in your spare time? I enjoy reading the Bible. When there is time, I watch movies.

Giving your busy schedule as a Registrar, do you still find time to be with your family and play the father figure role?

I am married to a wife who is my closest friend and companion. Talso enjoy a very close relationship with my family. Tcherish my family. We pray together. We have a very strong family altar. My wife is a lecturer at Umudike

In the short period, you've been on seat as the Registrar, how would you describe your relationship with staff?

They have been very supportive. The staff accepted me for who I am. I promise to run an open administration not a bicycle leadership where you have those at the head having no regard for those under them. I am impressed with the reception accorded me by both teaching and non-teaching staff and even co-contestants for the position.

What's your view about the nation's present educational policies and in what areas would you suggest improvement?

Every society gets the education it deserves. I believe the educational system is a reflection of the system. The society is at a loss, so is the educational system. Education is capital intensive, it requires funding. Government needs to improve on the area of funding. The staff are doing their best to impact knowledge and to render services towards improving quality. There is need for the system to be reformed further to meet the expectation of the industry with regards to curriculum. These should be addressed.

AT LAST, A FOUNDRY IN FUTO

A Foundry in a University of Technology should be commonplace. It has however not been so. FUTONews brings you the journey so far from Prof. O. O. Onyemaobi, Dean of the biggest School, the School of Engineering & Engineering Technology.

Sir, we learnt there is a Foundry in FUTO, what is it all about?

A foundry is a place you cast materials in metal form for industries. happened is that some years ago, the University had an induction tunnel and that was during the time of Engr. Prof. C. O. G. Obah, that induction tunnel was fired and then, we had problems with it. But before then, they had sent some members of staff for training in Lagos and they came back. The tilting mechanism of the induction funnel was not operational, it didn't work, so we tried to work on it, change it or repair it,

but it has not been possible. A foundry is a place like I said earlier, where you can east metal spare parts and make most the things we use in our industries and the ones we use even in our day to day life. Most of them are cast materials.

There are different types of casting. If you go to Lagos, you get a lot of foundries that are working. Most of the foundry men were trained by the railways and you find some of them in Ikeja and also in Nnewi, we have a lot of foundries that are working where most spare parts are cast and many materials are made.

That's basically what we do in the foundry. We cast materials, spare parts or new things. One or two years ago, Engineering Materials Development Institute in Akure was given the contract to fabricate, or design a rotary furnace and we are fortunate to be one of the Universities that got it. Prof. Adewoye who used to be the Director is now in Abuja. It was during Njoku's administration that the rotary furnace was brought.

We had an initial teething problem for it to be brought here, but because Engineer Prof. Adewoye is quite accessible to us, their engineers brought it and decided to install it. After installation, they fired it and it was successful. We are very happy to have it. Now all the theories we have been teaching students, they can now see it practically. It was fabricated locally by Engineering Materials Development Institute, Akure under the directorship of Engr.Prof. O. O. Adewoye. That institute is an arm of the Federal Ministry of Science and Technology, Abuja.

Given the importance of the foundry to the engineering school, why is it coming so late?

Well, like I said earlier, we had a foundry at first which did not work. It was given to us during the World Bank Assisted Programme but that one hasn't worked.





We are still working on it, we hope it will be serviced, in fact, Engr. Prof. Adewoye has promised he's going to bring people who will service it. So by the time it is serviced and it works, we will have two units, a rotary furnace and an induction furnace. That induction furnace is more of an industrial one, and it can do more work than this other one. The temperature it will go to will be higher than the temperature that can be absorbed by the rotary one.

Given the nature of the foundry and its importance, would there be room for commercialisation?

We hope that by the time we do more work, we can go to town and that will attract commercial attention. Very soon, this will be on ground, possibly as soon as we round off our exams.

Of what benefit will the foundry be to the students, the staff and entire host community?

Quite a lot, quite a lot. Like I said before, before now we were teaching theories to the students, but now they will have a foundry to do their practical work. It used to be only when they go on industrial attachment that they can do this aspect. But now they can do the practical along side the theory work. We also have a course Eng. 201, Workshop Practice II, which has a

foundry section involves all the students in Engineering, School of Science, Project Management. It and will benefit quite a lot of the students.

Sir, we just learnt you've been reelected as Dean for another two years. What in your opinion informed your re-election?

The first time I ran as Dean of SEET some two years ago, there were few things I had in mind I wanted to do. I planned helping more staff and carrying the staff and students along. We were facing accreditation, both COREN and NUC accreditation. I felt that I will help the University as Dean of SEET achieve all their accreditation. By the special grace of God, when we had the NUC accreditation visit, all the departments in SEET were fully accredited. This has never happened before, that was something that happened under me as the Dean of SEET. For instance, FST that hadn't full accreditation was fully accredited under my former deanship. Also MME is now fully accredited. Also when we had COREN accreditation, which gave us accreditation for five major departments in SEET. Under my tenure also, the lecturers were moved from cubicles here in SEET to their permanent offices. The former cubicles are now lecture rooms. These are all achievements that informed my re-election. We had a drawing room which was taken over by water, and so I converted the former Conskiptech Laboratory into a well equipped drawing room. There were also a lot of promotions and I championed the checking of exam malpractice. when a man had done all these, it is natural for him to be re-elected.

Do you still have things you wish to improve upon?

I still have two Departments to be accredited by COREN. I have quite a lot of lecturers I whom would like to encourage to register with COREN and also get their Ph.D.


I will also want to encourage students to do their projects on time.

IWUOHA ASSUMES PRIDE OF PLACE IN FUTO AS FIRST ALUMNUS PROFESSOR

A distinguished alumnus of the third generation FUTO has recently earned a well-deserved promotion to the esteemed institution of Professor. We invite you to hear from our own Prof. Chinyere I. Iwuoha.

Sir, please tell us a little about yourself

am Professor Chinyere I. Iwuoha from Umuenyi Autonomous Community in Isiala Mbano LGA of Imo State. I am the third living son of my late parents. I was born on Saturday, 31st August 1957.



Prof. Chinyere Isaac Iwuoha had primary education between 1963 and 1972 at Calabar, Abeokuta and my hometown.

I couldn't start secondary education immediately after, because of both the war and indeed financial constraints. In 1976, I entered Obazu Community Secondary School, Mberi and came out in 1981 with 4As and 4 Cs, the eight papers I registered. Before the end of the last session in the school, I already enrolled for JAMB. I got admission





same year I graduated and was thus the first set of graduates that this University (FUTO) produced in 1985/86 session. I came out of the University with a Second Class Upper division with a CGPA of 4.06.

I served in Kwara State for NYSC in 86/87 session. While serving, I got a letter from EUTO saying I had been given scholarship by Tate and Lyle. That took me to the University of Ibadan where I did my Masters degree programme within record time of twelve months. That was in the 1987/88 session. I joined the services of EUTO in 1980 as Assistant Lecturer in 1992. I was promoted to Lecturer II, registered for a part-time Ph.D programme in the same year because I understand that to be the standard degree for teaching in the University. By 1995, I was again promoted to Lecturer I and got another promotion in 1998 to Senior Lecturer. I must state here that, though it seemed I was climbing fast, I had mentors who were very supportive and encouraging; their mentorship gave me the necessary and requisite impetus to advance. I was again promoted in 2001 to a Reader. Along the line, I got a research study felloship from an Organization in Sweden (International Foundation for Science) as study grant. I happened to be the 10th student that matriculated in the history of FUTO and now its first Professor of Food Science and Technology. I have been part of a team that produced one Ph.D graduate. I have singly supervised three Masters degrees and more than twenty first degree graduates.

You were once a student of this great University, how can you compare your days as a student and those of the students you now teach?

That is a question concerning two different worlds of affairs, FUTO of my days was far more advanced" than the FUTO I see now. In those days, there were deliberate, conscious efforts to learn. There was this general respect for elders and constituted authorities, good conduct inside and outside the University. For instance in my days, if you place a notice on the board, it will be there until the paper changes colour (from white to dirty-brown). However, these days, you hardy leave the notice board before the notice is torn into shreds off the board.

Then, there were efforts to acquire information and do assignments. People used to struggle and take pride

Nowadays, they want it from "paper to paper" and not from "paper to brain". One of the features of degeneracy is the magnitude and sophistication of exam malpractice these days.

Would you say FUTO fits into the vision you had of her in the 21st century?

We started on a temporary site. The facilities here now are much more compared with the transit ones. It has to fulfill the vision of "gown to town". For instance, the type of water we should be having here should be produced by FUTO. In terms of energy, FUTO should not be depending on NEPA, FUTO in the 21st century should be self-sufficient, energy-wise. Our mechanical workshops should be expert-consulting outfit, information for

instance should now be gathered on the table of every staff (full ICT offices for every senior staff and PG student). Most manual things should have vanished by now. Locally. FUTO has set a standard that sold the students in the past. Now there is degeneration. Parents should stop manipulating the results and admission of their children. The last FUTO post UME assessment (i.e. 2005/2006), exposed most of these For instance, a lady from Bayelsa who scored 293 in JAMB made less than 60 out of 400 points in post UME. How do you reconcile that?

The Alumni as any other trade union always comes to the Chief Executive or Office of the University development to air our feelings concerning the standards because most of them (Alumni) are employers. The first first-class lady in the history of FUTO graduates was from the Department of FST. She sat for a Bank aptitude test scheduled for 1st class graduates, came tops and was employed as against those who graduated in other fields. If you visit any examination venue, what you see will disgust you. That is the level the system has gone down to.

Having attained the peak of your career, how do you feel to being addressed as a Professor?

How I feel? I feel glad and challenged because people are expecting more from me. Everything I do will attract attention. My critics now increase. The promotion challenges me to be more humble than I have ever been. Pomposity should be put aside. I know I should read more than before and strive to replicate myself; else if I leave the system I will be permanently forgotten. Of course any Professor who does nor replicate himself/herself is finished, because when he/she is out of the stage, will



seem he/she never was in that profession/carrer.

In what ways would you use your present position to improve the lot of your students?

I will use my ideas to improve the lot of the students. Designing more researches and professing (allowing and injecting/propelling) fresh ideas.

Would you say the degeneration of the standard has crept into the academia?

Yes, degeneration has equally crept into the teaching staff. Some have the job in their blood, ready to go extra mile. Some others are so much interested in money. Otherwise, how do I explain a situation were someone returns an "A" grade to a student who does not worth a "C" grade because of money? Some lecturers are not outright progressive. There are different categories of lecture. There are those who aspire to be very useful and there are the frustrated ones who have excessive love for money.

What do you do in your spare time?

I used to do a lot of sports as a student. I don't think I have been doing enough sports lately. At home, I play music. I eat cautiously. No excess calories. I am not so much of an out door person. Besides I am a Pentecostal so all the preaching and dancing is enough exercise for me.

Who are your mentors?

One of my mentos is Professor E.N.T. Akobundu. When I came into FUTO in 1989, he started challenging me to begin checking my works and assess myself. This helped me to know when I was being wrongly assessed. He always encouraged me to be productive. He used to always emphasize that "A job is not finished

until it is well done". Encouragement and positive propelling are what I also do to those under me.

Another of my mentors is Professor J. C. Obiefuna. I can hear his voive ringing in my ears, "publish or perish". encouraged me to show it by action so that people will talk about the result. He also told me "it is better to be time-barred than to be paper-barred". And he has always been willing to help when called upon.

Last Word:

My last word is that those who are coming up the ladder should be ready to work hard and have the humility to go through tutelage. The humility to go through a mentor is very challenging.

FUTO VC **LAUDS PRESIDENT** OBASANJO

Due Process is Bottleneck Against Corruption

Prof. Celestine O. E. Onwuliri, the new Vice-Chancellor of the Federal University of Technology, Owerri during a familiarisation tour to the School of Science (SOSC) lauded the Reform Agenda of His Excellency, President Olusegun Obasanjo.

According to him, 'Due process' was remarkably noteworthy, as a bottleneck against corruption, inefficiency and ineffectiveness. Against that background, he charged staff of the School to apply the principle of 'Due Process' to improve service delivery. He described SOSC as "my own School, having been there as an external examiner in the past". He said that his visit was to identify areas of strength / weakness; opportunities and

threats in the School, so as to determine the way forward.

In his response to the Associate Dean of the School of Science, Prof. K. M. Ibe, who gave a run-down of the problems faced by the school, the Vice-Chancellor noted that as a pioneer School, offering service courses to the entire University, the burden on the lecturers would be great with facilities over stretched, and promised to address their problems.

For Prof. Onwuliri, fund raising must be made an institutionalised programme in FUTO, since in his words "I am in hurry to achieve the way forward".

On behalf of the entire University Community, he expressed profound sympathy over the tragic loss of the brother of Prof. M. O. E. Iwuala, Dean, School of Science. He bemoaned the untimely death of the deceased and affirmed his care for, and concern about the welfare of staff

Earlier in the School of Health Technology (SOHT), the Dean, Prof. (Mrs.) B. N. Anyanwu told the Vice-Chancellor that the School had five departments, located in one building, with only one classroom and without any, laboratories and academic staff offices.

The Vice-Chancellor indicated special interest in the School and said that he hoped to improve its image and status and to maximise its competitive advantage. He said that two new departments, Pharmaceutical and Medical Sciences would be created within the School before the end of his tenure.

Similarly, five of the six Engineering departments assessed by the Council for the Regulation of Engineering in Nigeria (COREN) between March 5-9, 2006 viz Agricultural Engineering, Chemical Engineering, Electrical/Electronic Engineering, Mechanical Engineering and Material and Metallurgical Engineering have been fully accredited for another period of five years, 2006 - 2011, while the Civil Engineering department received interim accreditation for two years.

In a letter addressed to the Vice-Chancellor, the Council of COREN also stated that the Department of Petroleum Engineering and Polymer/Textile Engineering will be re-visited on a future date.

AS A NEW CHAPTER UNFOLDS, VC EDUCATES STAFF ON WORK ETHICS

The new Vice-Chancellor, Prof. C. O. E. Onwuliri on July 18, 2006 jointly addressed the staff of the Vice-Chancellor's Office and the Information, Public Relations and Publications Unit.

During the meeting he enjoined the staff to work diligently and in friendship with one another to achieve his vision as Vice-Chancellor. He described the office of the Vice-Chancellor as the engine house of the University and charged the staff to be punctual and to recognise their special role in quick service delivery.

AGRIC TO GENERATE 50% OF IGR

-I want to see a Productive Agric Farm - New VC

Prof. Celestine O. E. Onwuliri, Vice-Chancellor of the Federal University of Technology, Owerri has challenged the School of Agriculture and



Agricultural Technology (SAAT) to generate 50 percent of the university's internally generated revenue. He made this declaration during his familiarisation tour where he met with the Dean, Professors and Heads of Departments in the School at the SAAT Conference Room.

He said that the transformation of SAAT into a Centre of Excellence and a major revenue earner was a priority for his administration. He noted that the School possessed the intellectual capacity and urged the teaching staff to bring to bear their expertise on the development of areas like fishery, cassava and plantain production. He said that he wanted to see a productive agricultural farm that could be proudly showcased to national and international research and developmental bodies.

Addressing the complaints of inadequate office space, furniture and persistent power outage made by Dr. P. C. Obasi, the Associate Dean and representative of the Dean (SAAT), the Vice-Chancellor promised to work with Council to alleviate the constraints of the work force.

Earlier at the School of Management (SMAT) the Dean, Prof. C. C. Ntamere welcomed the Vice-Chancellor and his team. He lamented the lack of infrastructure, especially in view of the MBA Accreditation due to take place soon.

In his response, the Vice-Chancellor promised to approve funds for the immediate provision of all requirements for a successful accreditation of the MBA performance. He described the School as "the goose that lays the golden egg" and assured the Dean that he would recognise hard work, and at the same time pay honorarium to lecturers teaching programmes that were not NUC-funded.

At the Post-graduate School the Dean, Prof. C. I. Anunuso reviewed the programmes offered by the School and observed the pleasant coincidence of producing two successful doctoral candidates, just as the new Vice-Chancellor was touring. He however complained about the PG School not having a building of its own and as such, was greatly hindered in its operations and advancement.

The Vice-Chancellor considered the absence of a PG building a minus for the University. According to him, excellence in scholarship is a must and is anchored and demonstrated in post graduate training, more so to provide the optimal student/teaching staff ratio for about 76 universities in Nigeria.

He thereafter directed the Dean to put forward a proposal for a Post graduate building, within the context of the University Master Plan for consideration and approval by Council.

VC PROMISES TO CREATE CENTRE OF EXCELLENCE IN ENGINEERING

With a burning desire to transform the citadel of learning called FUTO, the new Vice-Chancellor, Prof. C. O. E. Onwuliri said he would stop at nothing in making the(SEET) FUTO a centre for excellence, even as he promised to establish a new School of Environmental Technology.

He made this declaration while on a familiarisation tour. He used the opportunity to reiterate his commitment to his assignment as Vice-Chancellor and further stated that he would follow the path of reform and sustained development.

The Vice-Chancellor affirmed his belief in the calibre of manpower in the University. Professors, he said should pass on their talent, just as he advised them to reproduce themselves and emphasise post graduate training. He further challenged the School to generate funds through adaption and fabrication of technology. He noted the gender inequality in headship appointments and said he would correct the imbalance, in line with the Millennium Development Goals. Also, of major concern to him, was the rampaging scourge of HIV/AIDS in Nigeria.

The Dean of the School of Engineering and Engineering Technology (SEET), Engr. Prof. O. O. Onyemaobi proudly asserted that SEET was known for keeping standards and had secured full NUC accreditation in all its Engineering programmes. While stating that "without SEET, no FUTO", he pledged their loyalty and support to the Vice-Chancellor.

He also requested Management to complete the academic staff offices, recruit teaching staff and provide additional pews for student lecture halls. On a final note, he advised the new Vice-Chancellor to guard against sycophants who always sow seeds of discord and division and ultimately spell doom for any administration.

RESEARCH, PIVOT OF DEVELOPMENT -OMOKARO

The Dean of the University of Calabar Post-Graduate School and Chairman, Committee of Deans of Post graduate Schools in Nigeria, Prof. D. N. Omokaro while in FUTO on August 18, 2006 declared that Research was the measure of the ranking of the University System and the foundation for development.

He said this while on a courtesy call on the Vice-Chancellor after an onthe-spot assessment of the of the Post-graduate School in FUTO. According to him, the abysmal level of funding led to the dismal ranking of Nigerian Universities.





He therefore called for the ploughing back of 20% of resources generated from PG schools for their continued growth and development. He solicited the support of the Vice-Chancellor in introducing Research and Training as funding elements in the budget.

Earlier, the Secretary of the Committee and Dean, PGS Unilag, Prof. F. O. Olatunji informed his host that the Committee, founded in 1987 to contribute to Post-graduate development in Nigerian universities was mandated to interact with Vice-Chancellors the private sector, the National Assembly, NUC, ETF and other bodies to provide an enabling environment for research.

The Vice-Chancellor, Prof. C. O. E. Onwuliri warmly welcomed the team and thanked them for rising to the challenge. He said that the first thing he did on assumption of duty was to secure the approval of both NUC and Council for a befitting Post-graduate School building which would occupy a position of prominence.

While noting that the development of Post-graduate training was of paramount significance, he urged the academia to show full commitment to academic excellence.

Furthermore, the NUC Director, Quality Assurance, Prof. Placid C. Njoku who was coincidentally in FUTO at the time stated that the NUC Nigerian Universities Research and Development Fair gave visibility to intellectual ability and was in consonance with sustaining quality assurance in the University system. He commended the Committee for sensitising the Vice-Chancellors on the significance of Research.

The Dean of the Post-graduate School in FUTO, Prof. C. I. Anunuso was present at the meeting. The visiting team was later hosted to a special luncheon, with Principal Officers, Dean, PGS-and Secretary, PGS Chief R. U. Ugbolue present.

FUTO HOLDS PUBLIC LECTURE ON BIRD FLU

In the first week of February 2006, the news of the outbreak of Bird Flu in Sanbawa farm in Kaduna, spread like wild fire all around the country. The unfolding scenario sent shock waves. fear and uncertainty down the spine of both farmers and consumers of products alike.

Rising to the challenge, the Department of Animal Science and Technology in FUTO held a public Lecture on Avian Influenza (Bird Flu) in Nigeria.

The former Acting Vice-Chancellor of the University, Engr. Prof. B. A. Nwchukwu in his opening remarks, commended the Department of Animal Science and Technology for initiating the public lecture, which he considered to be more than a mere academic exercise. He stated that the University's mandate was not only too produce experts in Agriculture and Agricultural Technology, but to also research into and proper acceptable solutions on related national and international problems.

According to him, the unpleasant scourge was no doubt, a cog in the wheel of the agricultural progress of the world and noted that through the lecture, the university would be fulfilling a critical aspect of its objectives.

The first lecture was presented by Prof. M. U. Iloeje; a guru in Animal Genetics. His presentation could best be described as a dilated analysis of the phenomenon under study. He identified the prevalent bird flu as H5N1 and emphatically warned that people should not eat infected poultry products.

The second lecture titled "The Aetiology, Epidemiology, Management and Control of Avian Influenza (Bird Flu)" was presented by Dr. I. C. Okoli, a Senior Lecturer and veterinary doctor in the Department of Animal Science and Technology, while the Director of Health Services, Dr. C. O. Emerole delivered the third paper; "The Implication of Avian Influenza on Human Health".

The fourth, "Bird Flu - The Farmers Experience" was presented by Chief (Sir) Duru, the Chairman of Poultry Farmers Association of Nigeria, Imo Sate Chapter. Sir Duru in his presentation literally painted the picture of the agony poultry farmers had gone through due to the outbreak of Bird Flu, while labeling it, "political farmers politics". He stated that the agony of the farmers was aggravated by the mismanagement of information by the media, who blew the news out of proportion. He implored the Federal Government to treat the farmers as disaster victims, by granting them aids and not loans, to save the sector from total annihilation. He also advised farmers to insure their farms against disasters.

The last paper for the day "Avian Influenza - My Personal View" was delivered by Prof. A. B. I. Udedibie, through a representative Mr. E. B. Etuk. In his presentation, he stressed that the world and Nigeria in particular had over reacted to Avian Influenza while stressing that it was a money spinning plan set into motion by some greedy people, citing Anambra State, where false news of bird flu infection was promptly contradicted by the State Government.

The lecturers in their presentations agreed that poultry product from uninfected farms were safe for consumption and advised that poultry products should be well cooked before consumption. They

recommended the quarantine of infected areas while infected birds were to be incinerated or buried. They also noted that Imo State had not experienced any outbreak.

The occasion which was moderated by the HOD AST, Dr. B. O. Esonu, had in attendance, the Dean (SAAT), Prof. E. T. Eshett, Prof. M. 1. Nwufo, representatives from the Federal and State Ministries of Agriculture, large and medium scale poultry farmers and staff and students of FUTO.



The Treasurer, (Dr.) Mrs. Edna Mathews-Njoku drew his attention to the issue of non payment of allowances to Head of Departments and non-remittance of tax deductions to the Board of Internal Revenue, which had made it impossible for members of staff to get tax clearance from the Board.

Chinweze, Officio member of ASUU suggested that fallow land in the University could be ploughed and leased out to indigenes for farming, while the University buys back the farm products for sale to large scale consumers. VC ADDRESSES 15TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY



The address which touched almost all aspects of the University administration could be described as a drilling pipe into the seed of time. as the renowned professor of Zoology, who was two time Commissioner in Imo State and recently Acting Vice-Chancellor of University of Jos bore his mind on the present and unfolded his vision for the future.

At the beginning of his historical speech, he gave thanks to God for making his appointment possible and also extended his gratitude to

President Olusegun Obasanjo for approving his appointment, while assuring him of his loyalty to the Federal Government.

He congratulated the 8th Governing Council of FUTO for successfully conducting the interviews for Vice-Chancellor and Registrar, stressing that he would not betray the confidence they reposed in him. He further promised that he would do everything humanly possible to reconcile all members of the University Community so that they could work together to move FUTO forward. He went further to enumerate the priority of his administration thus:

- reating a good liaison between the University and the Government on one hand and between the University and its host communities on the other
- enhancing fund procurement, internal revenue generation and mobilisation as well as ensuring judicious application of financial resources.
- enhancing performance at all levels in the University, through the use of Information and Communication Technology (ICT), and the strict observance of 'Due Process in admissions, employments, promotions and contract awards and in all other aspects of the University.
- enhancing physical and structural development of the University in keeping with our approved Master Plan, while emphasising maintenance culture and the elimination of waste.

- providing relevant goal-oriented, qualitative undergraduate and postgraduate training for, our students and other trainees
- providing adequate tools, equipment, materials and good services for the pursuit of excellence in scholarship. Ensuring capacity building and gender equality at all levels
- Pensuring staff and student welfare and encouraging vibrant and responsible staff and student unionism. Alleviating the transport problems of staff and students who have to commute to campus daily owing to the peculiar circumstances of FUTO.
- eliminating cultism, examination malpractice, drunkenness and drug addition, HIV/AIDs and other common vices from the University.
- strengthening general administration in line with the changing realities of the time.
- Pextending the frontiers of the University, nationally and internationally in a world that is becoming highly globalised.
- ensuring implementation of Government policies especially on corruption, Reforms, NEEDS, MDGs
- Ifacilitating infrastructural development in FUTO especially with respect to staff housing on campus and hostel development for students.

Prof. Onwuliri told the assembly that he would institutionalise revenue generation in FUTO as an on-going programme, involving all stakeholders.

To further increase the level of internally generated revenue he, promised to resuscitate all the ailing / handicapped FUTO commercial ventures.

The Vice-Chancellor also called for a total attitudinal change while imploring all staff to be committed, pro-active, result-oriented and efficient. He stated that prompt payment of salaries will be

maintained while staff training would be a major focus of his administration.

He used the opportunity to call on Heads of Departments whose programmes currently have denied or interim accreditation to commence the remediation process while assuring them of his advice and necessary financial support.

He was full of gratitude to his predecessors whom he said sustained a legacy of peace, stability and distinction in the University. The ceremony witnessed by Principal Officers, Deans and Directors, HODs, HOUs, Co-ordinators, the Student's Union Government a large turn out of staff and the media was indeed rewarding for Prof. Onwuliri who summed it up in the following words "Unless the Lord builds the house, in vain does its builders labour" (Ps. 127 vs. 1).





ICPC MONITORS VARSITY FUNDS

The Director of Education (Anti-graft Commission) Mrs. Rashidat Okoduwa has expressed dismay at the level of rot in the accounting system of the nation's university system.

According to Mrs. Okoduwa, the

Independent Corrupt Practices (and other related offences) Commission ICPC will henceforth monitor the use of funds by the universities Explaining the rationale behind the new focus on university accounting system, the Commission's chief stated that the idea was not only to prevent illegal diversion of public funds, but to create a graft free environment in which future leaders were being groomed.

According to her, it was now an offence punishable under the ICPC act to embark on any expenditure, without adequate budgeting backing and statutory approval.

In a recent lecture by Okoduwa at the Ajasin University, Adekunle Akunaba - Akoko, Ondo State, titled: "University Administration and Due Process" she described corruption as a global human problem, a pervasion of normally and the exploitation of one's office for personal advantage".

In a bid to toe the due process line, the Bursar of the Federal University of Technology, Owerri Mr. R. U. Akujobi has in a memo to all Heads of Departments outlined the guidelines for the disbursement of Direct Teaching and Laboratory Cost Fund (DTLC) as follows:

✓ every Head of Department should constitute a DTLC Committee.

The Committee will articulate the requirements of the Department, obtain quotation and make a formal request to the Vice-Chancellor for approval.

where the Vice-Chancellor approves such a request, a Job Order/LPO should be issued to whoever that has been recommended and approved for the job.

the processed Job Order / LPO should be collected by the contractor/supplier.

when supplies have been made to the department, a Stores Officer of the Bursary Department would be

requested to assess and certify that supplies have been received and that the items are in compliance with the specifications. Where a Job Order is issued, an Estate and Works Officer will be required to certify that such a job has been satisfactorily done.

The Contractor will then be requested to submit his bill along with the Stores Received Voucher, and the Job Order/LPO to the Bursary Department for payment.



PROF. ONWULIRI @ SOUTH **EAST CONSULTATIVE** MEETING

rof. C. O. E. Onwuliri, Vice-Chancellor, FUTO was recently in Abakaliki for the South East Zonal Consultative Meeting on the Review of National Policy on Education (NPE 2004). We bring to you his verbatim presentation at the forum.

INTRODUCTION

It is indeed, my great pleasure on the occasion of this very important Zonal Consultative Meeting, to make my contribution to the review of a very important national document, the National Policy on Education (NPE).

This effort at reviewing the National Education Policy is both timely and necessary. First, as a policy, a periodic review is necessary to align it with developing current national initiatives, as well as, emerging global trends. When the National Policy was first enunciated in 1977 the educational system was 'manual'driven, while almost 30 years on, education has become electronically/ globally ICT-driven and Nigeria cannot be an exception. That is why we now have such concepts as eeducation, e-classrooms, e-library or even e-governance.

However, one significant improvement in Education in Nigeria, which we need to proudly acknowledge is the enlargement of opportunities particularly at the primary level stimulated by the commencement of Universal Basic Education (UBE). It is estimated that there are about 30 million pupils enrolled in the nation's primary schools currently and this number is expected to rise rapidly as the scope of UBE is expanded to include the "Home-grown feeding programme". The first graduates of UBE will be leaving school later this year, injecting an estimated 4.5 million pupils into JSS1. This implies that we expect about 4 million pupils to sit for SSCE/NECO examinations in 2012 and about 90 percent of that figure may seek for places at the tertiary level of education.

This is where there is a disconnect. The tertiary level of education lacks the capacity to meet the challenges posed by this surging statistic. One major effect of this constricted opportunity at the apex of the educational ladder is to create desperation, and this encourages malpractice and other associated vices.

Accordingly, a critical challenge of the current exercise at reviewing the National Policy on Education is to expand the resource capacity of tertiary education in Nigeria. Tertiary education is crucial to our efforts at reducing poverty, is a vehicle for technological advancement and a catalyst for increasing labour productivity.

We should also note that universities. although sitting at the apex of the education ladder need not dominate or even suffocate the education landscape. Universities have special roles to play distinct from those of polytechnics and other tertiary institutions, while these institutions need not aspire to be universities. They have their special roles that are not necessarily inferior in any respect to universities.

2. THE FOCUS OF THIS MEMORANDUM

The main thrust of the current review of the National Policy on Education ought to include a general improvement on quality of education at all levels and the enlargement of access to tertiary education especially those provided by Polytechnics/Monotechnics,

Colleges of Education and most importantly Universities. These efforts to improve quality should be made within the scope of the reform programmes of the present Federal Government which include elements of National Economic Empowerment and Development Strategy (NEEDS) and Millennium Development Goals (MDGs). This will imply developing set objectives that broaden the participation of the education sector in the reform process. These broad objectives could be stated as:

- Increasing carrying capacity at the tertiary level, while encouraging the promotion of gender equity.
- Using higher education as a tool for skill acquisition, social cohesion, ethnic harmony, job creation, poverty reduction (including retraining of work force/in service training).
- (iii) Infusing discipline in tertiary education (which includes eliminating malpractices and cultism).
- (iv) Strengthening private sectorpublic partnership, including making research findings available for private sector adaptation.
- (v) Using higher education to mitigate the impact of HIV/AIDS and other endemic diseases.
- (vi) Strengthening ICT capabilities in tertiary education (including setting up of model e-classrooms).
- (vii) Raising the profile of research in tertiary institutions as a vehicle for technological advancement.

3. THE IDENTIFIED GAPS

While we seek to increase available places in higher education for products of the present secondary schools, we need to realise that a majority of these graduates are really unsuitable for higher education





places. This is the result of the expansion of opportunities without congruent improvement in quality. Higher institutions are now faced with the task of mounting remedial programmes to prepare many candidates for admission into universities particularly in the core science subjects of mathematics, physics, chemistry and biology. When this policy was formulated no one envisaged this or we decided not to acknowledge its existence.

One may argue that if quality assurance mechanisms are instituted at the UBE and post UBE levels, then remediation may be unnecessary but how soon will this be practicable. It is therefore important to consider institutionalising remedial and predegree programmes at the tertiary level with adequate budgetary provisions for their smooth operation.

Through out the NPE document the meaning and purpose of education was generally spelt out but not so with the 'school' or "educational institution". This current effort at revising the National Policy should define nationally what constitutes a 'school' at UBE and Secondary (SS1-3) levels with our National context. This definition is necessary to guide both private operators and even state governments in setting up and recognising 'setups' as either Primary (UBE) and Secondary (SS 1-3) schools. A situation where people rent small flats or construct shanties and call them schools cannot be accepted as they end up breeding individuals who constitute problems at later stages of the pupil's development, as well as, problems for the higher institutions. For example, in the modern era what constitutes a school should have specified classroom spaces, laboratories, library, play ground etc. as minimum requirements.

NEW POLICY

(i) It is also important to clearly state

the level of education that is a fundamental right for which access must be provided unhindered. Beyond this level the institution would need to operate in a manner that would permit generation of adequate financial revenue for normal operations.

- (ii) Higher education is impossible to execute without books and access to information, so we need to incorporate a National Book Policy that will give the practitioners of tertiary education unhindered access to books, journals and other information resources. Such a policy must remove duty on books.
- (iii) Finally, it should be a National policy to develop a multidisciplinary program to tackle the HIV/AIDS pandemic in Nigeria through tertiary education curricula. It is at this level that we can get a critical mass of educated people who can impart the awareness of dangers of unhealthy sex practices from National Youth Service (NYSC) to their work places. They will also be able to contribute to the fight against HIV/AIDS through research. Because of the gravity of the HIV/AIDS pandemic we need to develop institutional educational HIV/AIDS policy, which might include the right of persons including UBE pupils already infected with the disease in the educational work place.

CONCLUSION

I have acknowledged the progress made so far and I have indeed, in this short paper highlighted some of the areas of our educational sector that I believe require most urgent attention. The focus has been in my primary constituency- tertiary educationessentially because we believe tertiary institutions, in the end, should produce graduates with skills that respond to labour market and national economic and technological imperatives.

Admittedly, our approach to this review exercise should be holistic. which implies a balance between the UBE, Senior Secondary and tertrary levels in both quality, quantity and the demands of the economy. What we fail to do at the early stages usually spirals into more serious impediments at the later stages of the educational ladder. In the end whatever policy we arrive at should produce healthy graduates and practitioners suitable for an emerging and technology driven Nigerian economy.


